More Aid for Care of Needy Urged by Hospital Study Unit

Harrisburg — After five years of research, the Governor's Hospital Study Commission has reached a conclusion that any hospital economist knew all along.

It is: hospitals need more State aid for care of needy persons. Like \$20 million a year more, the commission says.

The commission, named in 1958 to make a 10-year study, suggested in its first report just revealed here, that the State stop paying a flat \$10 per day for each needy person.

Instead, the commission said, the State should sign a contract with commercial insurers or with hospitalization plans to ensure hospi-

tals are paid what they actually spend on needy patients.

Voluntary hospitals in 1962 spent \$55 million in free care, got back only \$16 million from the State.

The commission urged, too, that county governments increase their contributions from \$1.5 million to \$4.5 million.

Even then, the commission said, hospitals will be losing \$11 million a year on free service.
